Notes from Breakout Sessions:

- Cannot use a cookie-cutter approach for addressing digital divide:
- Kern County developed and conducted assessments for each individual and offered resources (AT/device, broadband, and training) based on the individual's specific needs and comfort level.
- Rural area issues:
 - Rural areas do not typically have broadband availability, only satellite internet which costs ~\$200/month to receive a decent connection.
 - FCC's "Companies Near Me" tool can provide consumers with information about participating companies in their area: <u>https://data.usac.org/publicreports/CompaniesNearMe/Downl</u> <u>oad/Report</u>
 - The FCC Broadband Deployment Map is also searchable: <u>https://broadbandmap.fcc.gov/#/</u>
 - Rural areas typically do not have strong cellular phone coverage, people have to buy extenders to install on their roofs to receive cell phone reception.
- Culture plays a part in how comfortable someone would be open/receptive to learning and using devices.
